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Overview

K-12 Cyber Awareness Month helps students and families learn how to build safer, healthier, and more responsible digital habits. Through downloadable tools like videos and infographics, family conversation starters, social media campaign, and practical supports, Ontario school boards can help foster meaningful conversations about online safety, digital citizenship, wellbeing, and Artificial Intelligence (AI) both in schools and at home.

Digital technologies, online platforms, and AI continue to play an increasingly central role in how students and families learn, communicate, create, and access information. As these digital experiences evolve, school boards have an important role to play in supporting cyber awareness, privacy, digital wellbeing, and responsible technology use across their communities.

Cyber awareness is no longer solely an IT concern. It is a shared responsibility and an important life skill that affects students, families, educators, and school communities alike.

By working together, we can help ensure that students, families, and educators have the knowledge, confidence, and practical skills needed to navigate today's digital world safely and responsibly.

What's New in 2026?

K-12 Cyber Awareness Month reflects an important evolution in approach. While previous campaigns included an emphasis on classroom implementation, this year's campaign focuses more broadly on:

- Building cyber-aware school communities
- Encouraging family engagement and discussions at home
- Supporting digital wellbeing
- Promoting privacy and online safety awareness
- Helping students and families understand responsible AI use
- Creating a culture of cyber awareness that extends beyond the classroom

How school boards can use this campaign

K-12 Cyber Awareness Month has been designed as a flexible, turnkey campaign that boards can implement entirely, partially, or adapt to local needs.

1. Family Engagement

Encourage schools to share campaign resources with parents and caregivers. The 2026 campaign places special emphasis on encouraging meaningful discussions at home about:

- Online safety
- Social media
- Cyberbullying
- Healthy technology use
- Privacy
- Artificial Intelligence

2. Communications & Awareness

Use the resources to build a cyber awareness campaign throughout October.

3. School-Based Promotion

Encourage principals and school leaders to feature campaign content through:

Cyber Awareness Month can serve as a catalyst for year-round conversations about cyber security, privacy, digital citizenship, wellbeing, and AI.

Suggested Activities & Channels

The campaign has been designed to make participation easy:

Channel	Suggested Activity
Website	Link directly to the K-12 CAM website and weekly themes.
Social Media	Follow, share, and amplify CAM Facebook and Instagram content.
Newsletters	Include weekly cyber awareness tips and campaign resources.
Parent Outreach	Promote family discussion guides and conversation starters.
Posters	Display posters in schools, libraries, hallways, staff rooms and common areas.
Digital Signage	Display graphics, posters, and key messages.
School Events	Introduce weekly themes during assemblies, open houses, and parent engagement events.
Staff Meetings	Include a brief cyber awareness update or resource spotlight.
Board-wide competitions	Creative media or writing competitions among students to promote cyber awareness.
Classroom	Discussion starters to support other curriculum-centred teaching.
Year-Round Use	Revisit resources throughout the school year.

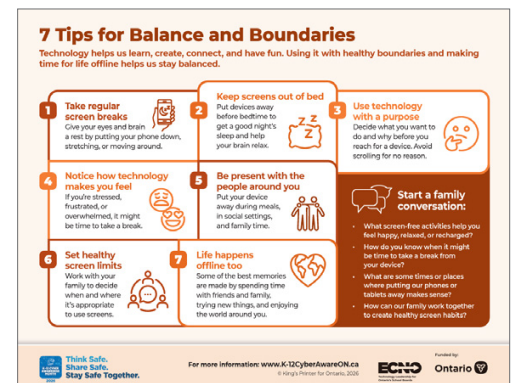

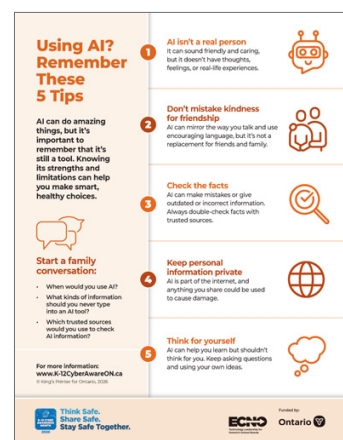
